

#### **Executive Summary**

#### **Background**

Bafwasende, a chefferie (and territoire) located adjacent to the north of the Maiko National Park in the extreme northwest of the Maiko-Tayna Kahuzi Biega Landscape, will undergo a process to develop a Land Use Plan as a Community-Based Natural Resource Managemen (CBNRM) area. Bafwasende has several unique characteristics:

- -Ecologically, it shares the same east-west altitudinal gradient from higland to lowland forest as Maiko NP. 2008 surveys in the boundary between Bafwasende and Maiko showed presence of elephant, chimpanzee, and okapi, among others.
- -The only part of the landscape falling within the Province Orientale (along with a fraction of Maiko NP).
- -Acts as the gateway to the Loya Sector of the Maiko NP, through the towns of Opienge and Angumu.
- -A highly conflictive area. Given its remote location buttressed to the south by the Maiko NP, it has been for long time a refuge for armed groups. It has been the scenario of recent fighting between the FARDC and Mai-Mai groups.

In the context of CARPE, Bafwasende has been the subject to very limited work. In the first CARPE phase, Innovative Resources Management, Inc (IRM) participated with limited conflict-resolution interventions.

#### Planning team

In 2009, DFGFI will start the process to develop a Land Use Plan following the USFS model for CBNRMs. It will be based upon its successful approach used in the UGADEC areas to the south of Maiko NP. The lead planning agency will be for the time being the ICCN, as Bafwasende is within the Maiko buffer zone. However, it envisioned that in the medium term, one or several local groups may take the leadership of managing the CBNRM area.

#### Information and data gathering

Given the limited existing information about the area, the process will require gathering of existing available information, and to fill the gaps to develop a base map.

Security permitting, additional surveys are planned in 2009 by DFGFI in the Maiko NP/Angumu area.

#### **Public participation strategy**

A public participation strategy will be developed, including an initial meeting with local groups, interested NGO parties and led by the Maiko NP ICCN administration. This meeting will allow the identification of a stakeholder group able to participate in the data collection and the development of the LUP.

#### Formal recognition of plan

As the plan develops, it will be considered as part of the Maiko NP buffer zone engagement plan for official recognition purposes. However, once the stakeholder group defines an appropriate management structure, a strategy to obtain formal recognition will be defined.

#### **Vision and Objectives**

The first stakeholder meeting will provide a draft vision and objectives, which will be refined as the process advances.

#### Microzoning

DFGFI will provide guidance on micro-zone types used in other CBNRMs. As information becomes available, they will be adapted and their precise locations defined.

#### Implementation of macrozones

Community-based development activities will be identified and implemented with the stakeholder group. In the UGADEC model, they typically support basic needs, such as health, education, and food security.

#### Monitoring

Given the amount of illegal and insurgent activity in the zone, monitoring will likely remain a challenge in the area in the near future.

Project implementation monitoring will be done by ICCN, DFGFI an other members of the stakeholder group.
